





Hansard bound volumes from 1909 to 2007/8

Hansard is an edited verbatim record of what was said in Parliament. It also includes records of votes and written ministerial statements. The report is published daily covering the preceding day, and is followed by a bound final version. We have digitised the bound volumes from 1909 up to where the daily reports start on PIO in 2007/08.



Lords Papers and Bills 1919 to 2005/6



The House of Lords is the second chamber of the UK Parliament. It is independent from, and complements the work of, the elected House of Commons. The Lords shares the task of making and shaping laws and checking and challenging the work of the government.

House of Lords Papers are papers which result from the work of the House and its Committees or are otherwise necessary for its work.

Standing Committees/Public Bill Committees 1919 to 2005/6

A Public Bill Committee is a committee set up by the House of Commons to examine the details of a particular Bill. All Bills, other than Money Bills, are automatically sent in a Public Bill Committee following their second reading unless they are committed to a Committee of the Whole House. The composition of the committees must match the size of the parties in the House.

The House of Commons uses other general committees to debate delegated legislation and proposals for European legislation and other European Union documents. Public bill committees were known as "Standing Committees" until 15 November 2006.
